EDITORIAL





CONSERVING THE 'GREEN GOLD'



Suriname is proud to be the most forested country in the world. 93% of its territory is covered by primarily pristine forest with a very high biodiversity. As part of the Guyana Shield which borders the Amazon, the Surinamese forest is of global importance for the ecosystem services. It is also of primary importance to combat climate change of which deforestation is one of the main causes. Through conservation of its forest, Suriname is able to earn 'carbon credits' for sustainable economic developments.

Through global industry, agriculture, transport, consumption and deforestation, large amounts of carbon dioxide (CO_2) remain in the atmosphere. This 'extra blanket' causes global warming and thus climate change. Trees (and plants) have the crucial task to take up CO_2 during the day. Due to large-scale deforestation, an enormous carbon storage capacity gets lost, releasing CO_2 as 'greenhouse gas'.

Of the global CO_2 emissions, 20 percent comes from deforestation, in particular in South America, South-east Asia and Africa. The annual deforestation in Suriname which is 0.05 percent, is 'relatively low'. It is, however, still an alarming doubling, in comparison to 2009 with 0.02 percent. In Suriname, mining is the cause of 73% of deforestation whereby small-scale, uncontrolled gold mining has the greatest impact on the environment. The increasing timber production causes 'forest degradation'.







REDD+ PROGRAM

Suriname is a member of the UN Climate Change Convention. In 2008, the agreement was made to drastically combat deforestation. A particular appeal was made therewith on forested countries to protect and sustainably manage their forest as much as possible. Suriname's 15.2 million hectares forest represents nearly 1 percent of the total global tropical forest. Through conservation of its forest, Suriname can make a considerable contribution in the fight against climate change.

The REDD+ Program of the UN was established in 2005 to promote the reduction of CO_2 emissions. It stands for 'Reducing Emissions from Deforestation and Forest Degradation'. The '+' stands for 'additional reduction' of CO_2 through sustainable forest management. Countries that exploit sustainable economic activities which also benefit the local indigenous and tribal communities, can be eligible for financing. REDD+ is not against mining, timber exploitation or opening up of land. It is about a balance between nature conservation, economic growth and social development, with a minimal negative impact on the environment.

CARBON CREDITS

REDD+ is implemented in over 60 countries. Suriname also advocates conservation of the 'green gold'. With the internationally earned 'carbon credits', other sustainable economic developments can be stimulated, such as a flourishing ecotourism and economic diversification. However, the growth of the Surinamese economy is as yet largely dependent on the extraction industries. This therefore poses to be a true challenge. REDD+ implementation is included in the government's National Development Plan (OP) 2017-2021.

In 2014, Suriname received funds from the World Bank for 'readiness'. The REDD+ Readiness Program is being implemented by the National Institute for the Environment and Development in Suriname (NIMOS), which has established a Project Management Unit for this purpose. "This is a business opportunity which we must make use of. We will be able to finance certain development goals", says Cedric Nelom, acting general manager of NIMOS.

The REDD+ Program has three phases: readiness, implementation and results-based. Suriname has almost completed the readiness phase. Amongst others, a National REDD+ Strategy was formulated. Also, the 'reference level' of national CO_2 emissions is established as a starting point for the calculation of carbon credits.

"The National REDD+ Strategy encompasses which developments are important within the scope of sustainable forest management and to combat deforestation and forest degradation", says Sandra Bihari, project coordinator of the REDD+ Program. "It indicates our long term ambitions and which implementation capacity is required to achieve these. As such, the National REDD+ Strategy is a tool for a sustainable and diversified economy." The strategy is formulated with wide engagement of the government, civil society, business community, technical institutions and the indigenous and tribal communities.

THE FOUR STRATEGIC LINES

The national REDD+ strategy comprises of four strategic lines. The first: 'continue being a high forest cover and low deforestation country and receive a financial compensation for this'. The second: 'sustainable forest management with early participation of various stakeholders, strict monitoring, control and supervision'. Concrete proposals were made for renewal of environmental legislation. It also regards capacity strengthening of institutions responsible for forest monitoring, control and enforcement, and of the local communities who are dependent on forests.

The Foundation for Forest Management and Production Control in Suriname (SBB), responsible, within REDD+, for the National Forest Monitoring System, is one of these institutions. Since 2012, SBB has a Forest Carbon Monitoring Unit. By using nearly real-time monitoring and satellite images, deforestation can be almost immediately detected. In the meantime, SBB has produced five deforestation maps. "With these, we are able to show all stakeholders the actual situation", says Rene Somopawiro, manager Research and Development.

The third strategic line: 'a new coherent legislation and planning for sustainable land use which should lead to an improved land management and forest protection'. The fourth: 'forest conservation, reforestation and scientific research and education in the area of sustainable forest management'.



HFLD COUNTRY

Suriname is an HFLD (high forest cover, low deforestation) country. During the Climate Conference in Bonn, the country confirmed that it will maintain this status. The Paris Climate Agreement compels countries to approach and adjust the drivers of climate change. A draft Environmental Framework Act is currently being discussed in the Surinamese Parliament. This regards a coherent environmental legislation as worked out by NIMOS, in collaboration with amongst others, relevant ministries and the Environmental Coordination Unit of the Office of the President.

"Suriname should be done with its role as a raw material supplier", says Winston Lackin, head of the Environmental Coordination Unit. "We practically earn nothing with this. End products, on the other hand, mean added value, employment and technology for the country. We also see diversification of our economy with regard to the environment." Almost all countries that have signed the Climate Agreement, have formulated a 'Nationally Determined Contribution' (NDC). Lackin: "The Climate Agreement shall take effect in 2020 and the NDC's are commitments. Each country must report every five years, otherwise you will not receive funds from the environmental treaties."



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

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DOMBURG LAARWIJK PLANTATION

From cozy and hectic Paramaribo we depart in our colorful 'Don Julio on the River' and sail down the splendid Suriname River to the picturesque village of Domburg, located in the Wanica district.

During this almost one and a half hour lasting trip, we sail past some special Surinamese points of interest. We get past a silent witness of WWII history, the wreck of the German merchant ship. Goslar, and sail under the famous Jules Wijdenbosch Bridge, also called "Bosje" bridge, past the former coffee plantation Peperpot.









DOMBURG LAARWIJK PLANTATION

All of this of course over delicious drinks and a Surinamese delicacy. Once arrived in the friendly Javanese village of Domburg, known for its lively village square with its lush mahogany trees, delicious Javanese cuisine, the soothing view of the river and the many sailing ships mooring here, we go ashore where you can comfortably simmer down.

From here we sail a further fifteen minutes to one of the many special plantations which Suriname is rich with...beautiful Laarwijk. This former sugar plantation is located in the Commewijne district. Here you will find a few legacies of colonialism such as sluices and the unique irrigation structures.





DOMBURG LAARWIJK PLANTATION

The local guide who knows everything about this extraordinary plantation will take you on a trip down memory lane and tell you all about this exceptional historical site. After a stroll of about an hour we conclude the visit with an on the spot serving up of a delicious Javanese-Surinamese meal. After you have recomposed yourself from all accumulated impressions and remarkable stories, we leave for the boat to set course for the city.



The **six-banded armadillo** (Euphractus sexcinctus),

also known as the yellow armadillo, is an armadillo found in South America. The six-banded armadillo is typically between 40 and 50 centimeters (16 and 20 in) in head-andbody length, and weighs 3.2 to 6.5 kilograms (7.1 to 14.3 lb). The caprice (hard shell on the back) is pale yellow to reddish brown, marked by scales of equal length, and scantily covered by buff to

SIX-BANDED ARMADILLO



PLANTAGE KATWIJK, ... FROM THE PAST, INTO THE PRESENT AND ON TO THE FUTURE

While driving along the narrow dirt road, on the last leg of the trip towards plantage Katwijk, one can't help but wonder what this area looked like, and felt like, around the second half of the 18th century when the plantation's rich history was just beginning to unfold. The peaceful tranquility that currently characterizes this rural part of district Commewijne, must surely be in stark contrast to the hustle and bustle that took place here in those colonial days marked by slavery and indentured labor, when the plantations in Suriname still flourished.

Historic records reveal many fascinating facts and anecdotes about this beautiful plantation situated on the left bank of the Commewijne River. It all starts in 1746 when the 13-year-old Alida Maria Wossink, by a gift from Governor Mauritius, becomes its first owner. She would however, be far from the last; the plantation would change hands many times throughout history. And while coffee was one of its most important crops from early on, fluctuating dynamics in the world markets would inspire changes there as well. Bananas, cocoa, sugarcane and cotton would at one time or another all sprout from the soils of plantage Katwijk. And when, around the beginning of the 20th century, most plantations in Suriname could no longer sustain their coffee crops, most of them transitioned to citrus. Katwijk was the only plantation that, in addition to its citrus crops, also maintained its coffee crops, and still does so today.

When Nagib Nouh-Chaia purchased the Katwijk plantation in 1974, the main crops were coffee, citrus and vegetables. Export, although no longer profitable, was still the main focus. Nouh-Chaia decided to concentrate instead on production solely for local markets and on the 'tree to table' process of producing coffee ready for consumption, under the brand name KW coffee. Of course, the plantation looked quite different by then. In over two centuries much had transpired on this 320-hectare plot of land along the Commewijne River. Certain remnants and indeed many stories, either written or told, do allude to the colonial splendor that was once part of plantatge Katwijk. It is said for instance, that on the other side of the tamarind lined lane that currently leads to the main house by the river, there once stood a beautiful plantation home surrounded by ornate gardens, with among them, a family burial plot. The only traces left behind are the house's brick water reservoir, and elsewhere on the property, the abandoned gravestones of Mr. and Mrs. Swaen, who owned the plantation around the early 1800's.
















A more tangible reminder of the past, is the old director's house, which although run-down, still possesses a definite, albeit eerie, quality of charm and beauty. This house, which is suspected to have been part of the plantation right from the start, was alternately inhabited by various directors, overseers and managers. The old coffee drying floors, the adjacent buildings and old coffee barn, are part of the coffee production process even today. Early in the 20th century one of those buildings, probably the coffee barn – although it was at that time a cocoa barn – housed a hospital, the only in that region of Commewijne. In later years, around the time of the second world war to be exact, that same building was also used to incarcerate prostitutes who had been removed from the streets of Paramaribo.

With its rich history, the intriguing stories, and all of the trials and tribulations experienced in the agricultural endeavors throughout the years, plantage Katwijk's latest management team consisting of siblings Monique and Joseph Nouh-Chaia, chose to set out on a new path of development. Agriculture would remain important, but diversification would be necessary to keep the business up and running. Taking advantage of its scenic location along the Commewijne River and the upward trend in tourism-related activities in the district of Commewijne, tourism was an obvious and promising choice for Katwijk. The first steps were taken in 2013 when plantage Katwijk added guided tours to its product range. Since then guests can enjoy informative tours along the citrus and the coffee crops, the processing facilities, as well as the most interesting historical spots on the plantation. Tours are concluded at the main house where guests can enjoy the river view and the cool breeze, and of course a delicious cup of freshly brewed KW coffee. In 2018 this spacious house by the river, named 'Huis Evelyne', was completely renovated, and it is currently available for rent to guests who want to enjoy a few relaxing days in this beautiful environment.

As various other buildings on the property are also being renovated, and the coffee crops, the citrus crops and the processing facilities are going through a rehabilitation process as well, things are moving in the right direction. At the same time, the immense amount of acreage still available for development has inspired a new business plan designed to attract new investors and entrepreneurs to the area. Fifty 3-hectare plots are currently available for rent by third parties. Entrepreneurs are welcomed to rent the space for various purposes including agriculture, education, research and tourism.

The plans and potential when it comes to the future of plantage Katwijk are limitless. And while solid and profitable business operations are key to the sustainability of the plantation, the owners also welcome community-based initiatives. Subjects such as education, research, cultural heritage, holistic initiatives, artist opportunities and much, much more, are often discussed while brainstorming about the future of plantage Katwijk. Indeed, the story of plantage Katwijk is forever evolving. From the past, into the present and on to the future.






THE BRILLIANT RUINS OF CHICHEN ITZÁ

Cenote Ik-Kil is located at a close distance to the Mayan ruins of Chichen Itza, on the highway to Valladolid. It is arguably one of the most beautiful cenotes of Mexico.

In order to reach the water you have to climb down 26 meters. The water is 40 meters deep while its diameter is 60 meters. Compared to other cenotes found in Mexico, Ik Kil has many facilities for visitors including a restaurant on site and even cottages where one can spend a few relaxing days. The waters of Ik Kil were considered sacred by the Mayans who performed here human sacrificing to their rain god. Spanish records report that young female victims were thrown alive into these cenotes, as sacrifices to the Maya rain god thought to live in its depths. Archaeologists have since found their bones, as well as the jewelry and other precious objects they wore in their final hours.















EL CASTILLO, CHICHEN ITZÁ

El Castillo, also known as the Temple of Kukulcan (or sometimes Kukulkan), is a Mesoamerica step-pyramid that dominates the center of the Chichen Itza archaeological site in the Mexican state of Yucatán. The building is more formally designated by archaeologists as Chichen Itza Structure 5B18. Built by the pre-Columbian Maya civilization sometime between the 9th and 12th centuries CE or AD, El Castillo served as a temple to the god Kukulcan, the Yucatec Maya Feathered Serpent deity closely related to the god Quetzalcoatl known to the Aztecs and other central Mexican cultures of the Postclassic period. The pyramid consists of a series of square terraces with stairways up each of the four sides to the temple on top. Sculptures of plumed serpents run down the sides of the northern balustrade. Around the spring and autumn equinoxes, the late afternoon sun strikes off the northwest corner of the pyramid and casts a series of triangular shadows against the northwest balustrade, creating the illusion of a feathered serpent "crawling" down the pyramid. The event has been very popular and is witnessed by thousands of visitors at the spring equinox, but it is questionable whether it is a result of a purposeful design, because the light-and-shadow effect can be observed, without major changes, during several weeks around the equinoxes. Each of the pyramid's four sides has around 91 steps which, when added together and including the temple platform on top as the final "step", may produce a total of 365 steps (the steps on the south side of the pyramid are eroded) (which is equal to the number of days of the Haab' year). The structure is 24 m (79 ft) high, plus an additional 6 m (20 ft) for the temple. The square base measures 55.3 m (181 ft) across.

The layout of Chichen Itza site core developed during its earlier phase of occupation, between 750 and 900 AD. Its final layout was developed after 900 AD, and the 10th century saw the rise of the city as a regional capital controlling the area from central Yucatán to the north coast, with its power extending down the east and west coasts of the peninsula. The earliest hieroglyphic date discovered at Chichen Itza is equivalent to 832 AD, while the last known date was recorded in the Osario temple in 998.

Chichén Itzá was more than a religious and ceremonial site. It was also a sophisticated urban center and hub of regional trade. But after centuries of prosperity and absorbing influxes of other cultures like the Toltecs, the city met a mysterious end.

During the 1400s people abandoned Chichén Itzá to the jungle. Though they left behind amazing works of architecture and art, the city's inhabitants left no known record of why they abandoned their homes. Scientists speculate that droughts, exhausted soils, and royal quests for conquest and treasure may have contributed to Chichén Itzá's downfall.



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
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
